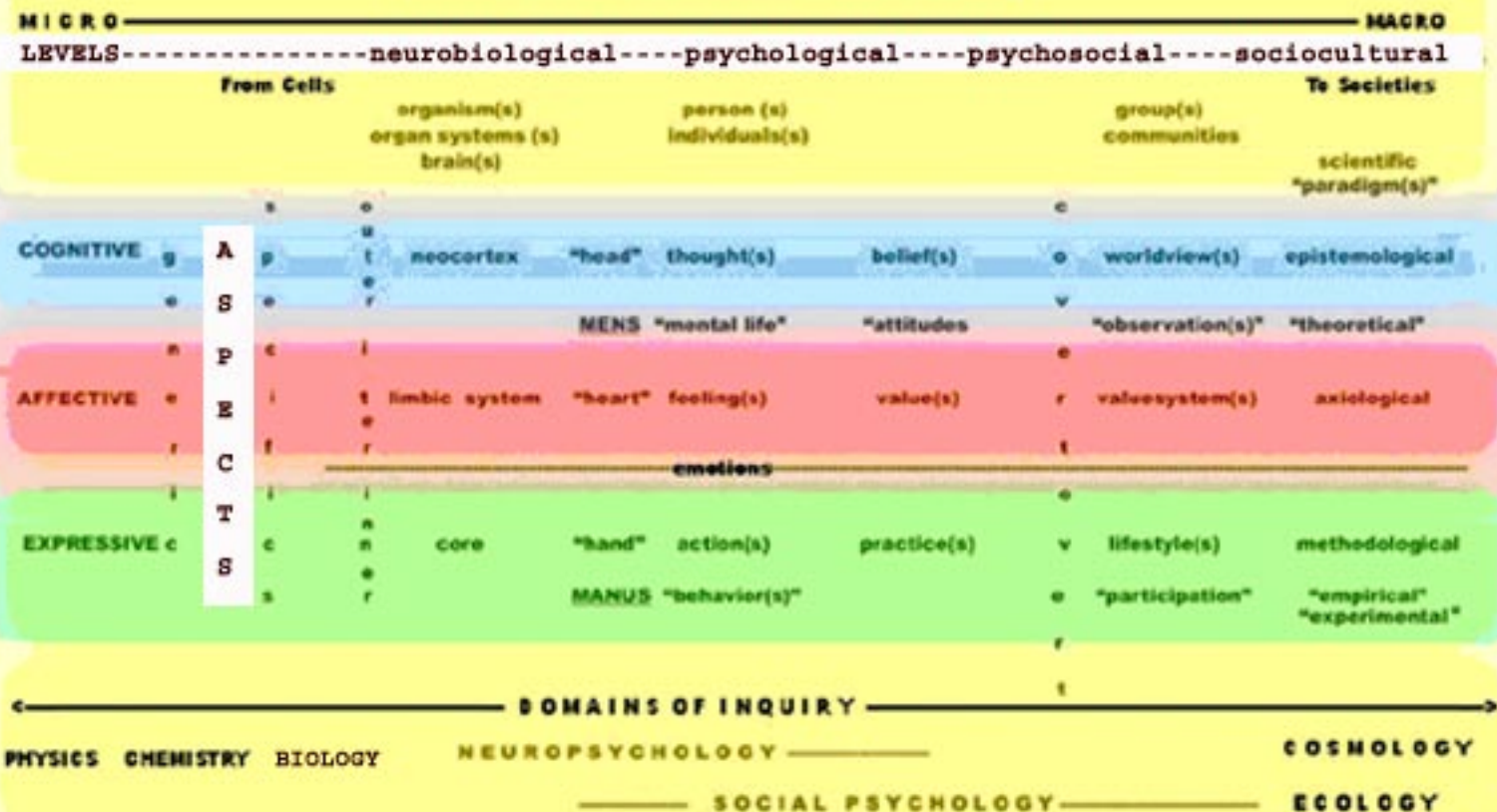


HUMAN SYSTEMS - LEVELS AND ASPECTS



Relations obtaining within/between/among HUMAN SYSTEMS are illustrated in terms of three principal ASPECTS and levels of organization. The scheme is intended to imply the structural and functional indefiniteness (or "fuzziness") of boundaries between the "cells" depicted here. Extensive overlapping, alternation and interpenetration if these aspects and levels is also assumed, as is the existence of extensive, mutually recurrent, interplay within, between and among the levels and aspects illustrated.
